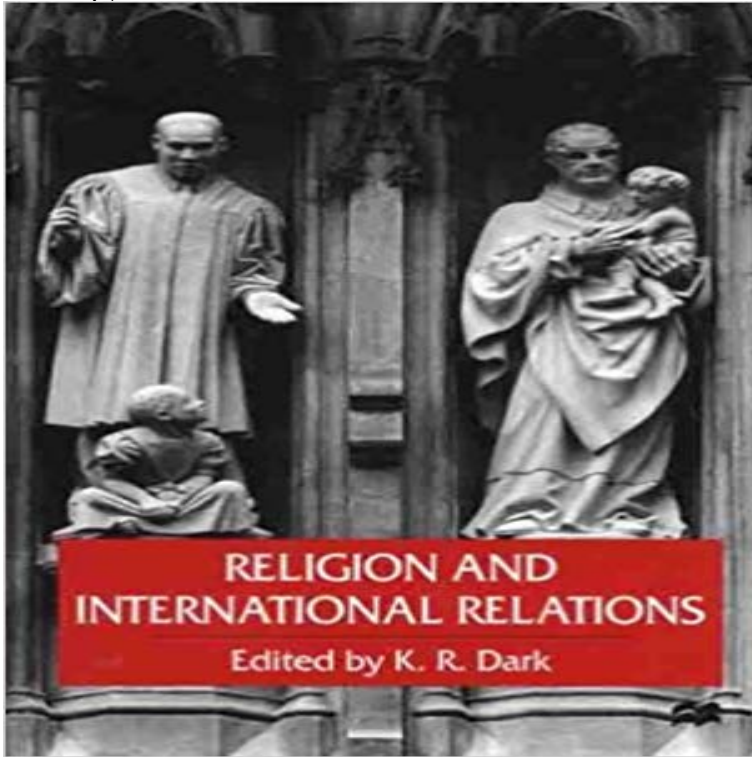


Religion and International Relations
