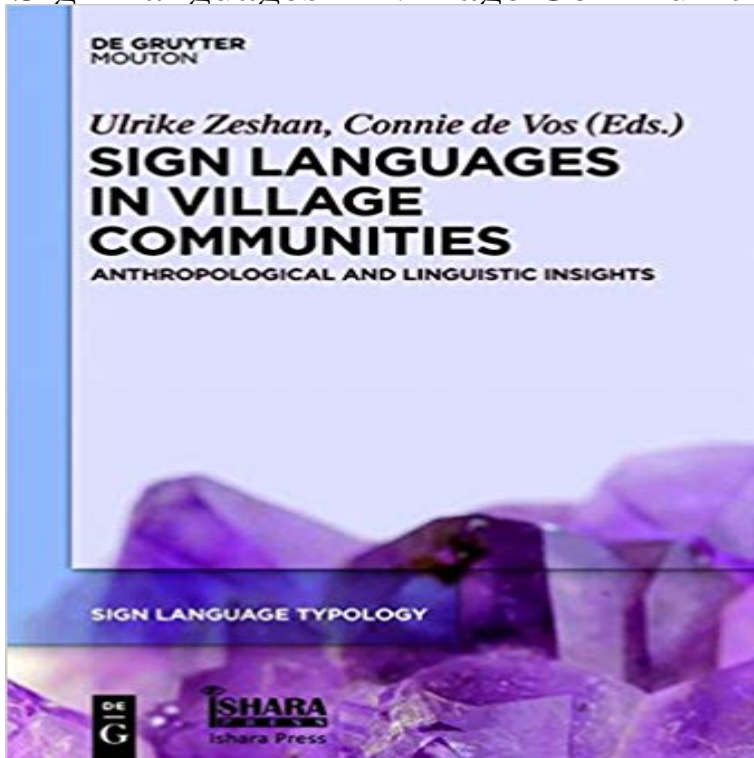


# Sign Languages in Village Communities (Sign Language Typology)
